






### **ADULT FICTION**

**How to Stop Time** - **Matt Haig** ~ Tom Hazard has a dangerous secret. He may look like an ordinary 41-year-old, but owing to a rare condition, he's been alive for centuries. Tom has lived history—performing with Shakespeare, exploring the high seas with Captain Cook, and sharing cocktails with Fitzgerald. Now, he just wants an ordinary life. So Tom moves back to London, his old home, to become a high school history teacher—the perfect job for someone who has witnessed the city's history first hand. Better yet, a captivating French teacher at his school seems fascinated by him. But the Albatross Society, the secretive group which protects people like Tom, has one rule: Never fall in love. As painful memories of his past and the erratic behaviour of the Society's watchful



leader threaten to derail his new life and romance, the one thing he can't have just happens to be the one thing that might save him. Tom will have to decide once and for all whether to remain stuck in the past, or finally begin living in the present.

### **AUTOBIOGRAPHY**


**Born to Run** - **Bruce Springsteen** ~ *Born to Run* will be revelatory for anyone who has ever enjoyed Bruce Springsteen, but this book is much more than a legendary rock star's memoir. This is a book for workers and dreamers, parents and children, lovers and loners, artists, freaks or anyone who has ever wanted to be baptized in the holy river of rock and roll. Rarely has a performer told his own story with such force and sweep. Like many of his songs ('Thunder Road', 'Badlands', 'Darkness on the Edge of Town', 'The River', 'Born in the U.S.A.', 'The Rising', and 'The Ghost of Tom Joad', to name just a few), Bruce Springsteen's autobiography is written with the lyricism of a singular songwriter and the wisdom of a man who has thought deeply about his experiences.

### **ADULT AUDIO FICTION**

Last Reveille - David Morrell ~ In 1916, Mexican bandit Pancho Villa raided the south-western border town of Columbus, New Mexico. Three hundred American soldiers fought four hundred attackers in a battle that ended with one of the last cavalry charges in U.S. history. Outraged, Congress ordered the U.S. Army to invade Mexico in pursuit of Villa. For the first time, trucks and airplanes accompanied U. S. cavalry into combat, practicing for America's entry into World War I. Influenced by Sam Peckinpah's *The Wild Bunch*, Rambo-creator David Morrell dramatizes this epic era in American history through the eyes of a civilian scout old enough to have been in the Civil War, the Indian wars, Cuba, and the Philippines. Knowing that his ways are finished, he teaches a young recruit about the past, at a cost he never expected to pay.

### ULYSSES CLUB AGM & FURTHER -APRIL - JUNE 2018

Because of the two months spent away, this writing will be very abbreviated. I have tabled 10 pages of writings!!

On Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> April, we left home towing our Coromal Element van heading for Cascades to Tim Bushby's for his birthday. We stayed here for 3 nights.

We stayed at Balladonia, Border Village, Ceduna, Pandurra station, Kapunda, Meningie, Kingston SE, Pinnaroo and Berri before reaching our intended destination of Barmera, South Australia for the Ulysses AGM.

The scenery across the Nullabor is really great and the shrubs and trees are green. Quite a lot of road kill between Norseman and Caiguna, mostly kangaroos, then from Border Village there was a patch of deceased wombats which is sad to see.

On the way across, we called in at Wirrulla, SA, for a morning coffee. A sign on way into town says "the town with a secret". We asked chap in shop what it was all about and he said that if he told the secret we would have to stay. We never did find out!!

Called in to the Watervale cemetery to visit the rellies then on to Kapunda caravan park for two nights Kapunda has lovely caravan park. Attached to the park is a huge dam structure which has reclaimed water to water oval and bowling club but not reclaimed enough to water caravan park. A very petty dam with lots of ducks. Then there is the memorial garden park with monuments devoted to men and women lost and hurt in war times, from the first world war. Lovely garden park. This then leads onto an oval and besides all of this is the Kapunda Bowling Club. A wonderful set up.

Heading towards Kingston SE, we took some not so popular roads so not much traffic. Passed by some farms – some have been seeded, some with green just showing through. Part of this stage of the day took us through some very hilly country. We crossed what seemed like a mountain range and the hills were covered in rocks and rocky outcrops. Once we started to descend this "range" although it was still hilly, there weren't as many rocks. Very little canola grown in the areas where we travelled. We stopped for lunch in a lovely little town Mount Pleasant. In the main street there were lots of plane trees, VERY OLD and gnarled. In fact, there were some very old gums which were also very gnarled. Quite beautiful.

While setting up at the Kingston Foreshore Caravan Park, I wore my raincoat due to heavy rain. However when all finished I removed my raincoat and I was wetter on the inside than the outside This evening we dined with a friend from Perth days, about 35 years ago, and her husband. Lovely to catch up and reminisce once more.

Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> May: Getting very close to our AGM spot. On to Berri to the lovely caravan park and given a spot overlooking the river. A little way away were many houseboats moored in the river. Drove to Barmera to check out where we would have to check in for the AGM on Monday. Only 13kms away from where we are staying.

Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> May — we drove to Nuriootpa to visit Liz Whenan. Rod and Liz were postmaster and postmistress in Wickepin many years ago. Unfortunately Rod was hospitalised with a stroke and complications, however we enjoyed catching up with Liz.

Monday 7<sup>th</sup> May – check in day. The event was held in the Field Day grounds – beautifully set up, mostly grass. As usual the huge tent catered for events, bands in the evenings, games and movies of past rides. About 2,500 registered for the event which we felt was a low number, but it seems as though the younger generation (40 plus) are not joining the Ulysses Club and many members have "ridden on". A separate building housed the traders and club merchandise as well as outside traders' stalls.

We were parked in our van next to three men from Adelaide. We had some wonderful conversations with them. They helped us with our awning then on one evening when the wind came up about midnight, it was all hands on deck to put the awning down. They helped us as well and commented the next day about being seen in their undies. When I said I hadn't noticed, I asked if they would like to do it again!!!

Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> May saw the official bike ride from Barmera to Renmark. Speeches and presentations were made in a park beside the Murray River. A VERY cold day. After lunch the AGM was held in Renmark. (I went to Laundromat and hit the shops while this was on). We attended the official dinner in the large tent and 2000 a delightful meal was served within half an hour.

The following day we attended the Church service in the big tent then attended the closing ceremony where more presentations were made. Our neighbour in the van next door received the trophy for the oldest rider – at 90. Left Barmera on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> May in 2°.

Two days later we arrived in Canberra and we had made arrangements to camp at Exhibition Park, also known as EPIC. This park is also the venue for the trots, farmers markets on a Saturday, Summernats in January and other activities held within this huge complex. The camping area is away from the other activities. This venue is also just 5 or 6 minutes from my sister's home. We stayed in Canberra for 8 days. The colours of Canberra in autumn are stunning. Although cold and occasionally frosty, days were beautiful. Met up with my bestie for lunch.

I was born in Yass, NSW and spent earlier years there. After we left Canberra we called into Yass and had a meal at the Liberty Cafe which is situated next to what was the Liberty Theatre. Such a step back in time to find a lot of the decor is original – from 56 years ago.

We had another couple of stops before arriving in Brisbane. On the way into Brisbane we travelled over Cunningham's Gap to listen to the Bell Birds once again. A few years ago, in summer, their call was almost deafening. This time there weren't nearly as many but their call just as delightful. When I was a little girl I used to go on holidays with Mum and Dad into NSW and we went through areas where there were Bell Birds. I hadn't heard them again until we travelled over Cunningham's Gap.

Spent 8 days in a Brisbane suburb caravan park near one sister and we spent a lot of time together. Only visited the other sister once at her home and it was exciting to see her lovely garden with a shade house full of flowering orchids.

After leaving Brisbane we camped at Inglewood, free camp at Collarenebri and into Lightning Ridge for 3 nights. We took a "Black Opal Tour" with Dave, our bus driver giving commentary – quite a character. In the evening we attended the happy hour around the fire with owners giving out pizza to attendees. We sat with a group of people from Tasmania. One of the ladies had a carella on her shoulder which kept our little group in stitches with his antics. He didn't want water when he asked for a drink – just wanted to drink her wine. He mimicked her phone ring tone and after the conversation asked "who was that?" Wish I could remember all the other hilarious things which passed his beak.

We visited the "Castle". Built by an Italian chap who began building this castle from the rocks miners had dug up from their mine diggings. He was to have put a roof on it but there was trouble with the council and others—not to be named - who objected him taking the rocks off the land!! It is open for viewing and the occasional fund raising event, but he built it all himself, mixed all the concrete in a wheelbarrow and made the metal decorations himself. A great place to visit and to hear the commentary about him. Because he didn't like the publicity, he built himself a humpy at the back of the castle where he lives.

Many tours are available in Lightning Ridge — either self drive or organised. You can't get lost on a self drive tour. All tours are identified by coloured car doors. i.e. follow the yellow car doors or follow the red car doors for your tour. Many of the miners have their huts hidden from view and a compass is used to find where someone lives if you know the coordinates.

We dined in the Bowling Club – LR doesn't have an RSL club like most places. The paintings around the wall are hilarious, celebrating Lightning Ridge's Black Opal classic. (More photos on display in our newsagency).

From Lightning Ridge to Bourke. A delightful town and we stayed three nights at the Kidman Camp - a lovely treed and green grass caravan park. We went to information centre and booked a tour which one walks through three buildings with stories of pioneers. Really very interesting. We boarded the PV (paddle vessel) for an hours trip on the Darling River. Very gentle and very pleasant.

We visited the cemetery to see where Fred Hollows was buried. He spent a lot of time in that area healing the aborigines. Such a simple man and his headstone is a huge smooth rock and the grave is under a Coolabah tree. His work is still being carried on in Bourke.

After leaving the cemetery we drove past a yard looking somewhat like our wheat bin yards with a weigh bridge. However, it was for cotton — a seed cleaning operation. I was fascinated to see the bright yellow colour of the wrapping of the cotton. The bales are massive, each weighing about 2½ tons. Seeding happens around September and harvested around March/April.

In Bourke, we bought a bottle of soft drink manufactured in Bourke.

At the caravan park we attended "Poet on a Plate" where Frank recited poetry, sang songs accompanied by a guitar or with out, and told lots of stories, mentioning a lot about Western Australia. He is of Irish descent but lots of Austalian stories, especially about shearing. We all took our own plates and cutlery and had the choice of stew with rice or Dahl with rice — or both. Of course there was a fire in a pit which was very comforting. A sweet tart was served after the main meal and we helped ourselves to tea and/or coffee.

Heading home we stayed at Wilcannia, Kimba, Penong, Nullabor, Caiguna, Esperance, Cascades, and Wickepin on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> June.



### Lemon-scented lamb casserole with winter vegetables

1 bay leaf

3 sprigs fresh oregano

3 stalks fresh flat-leaf parsley

1 kg neck lamb chops

2 tbsp plain flour

2 tbsp olive oil

3 small (300g) red onions, quartered

3 cloves garlic, sliced

1/3 cup (80ml) lemon juice

3 cups (750ml) salt-reduced chicken stock

2 medium (500g) parsnips, halved, quartered

lengthways

800 g butternut pumpkin, peeled, deseeded, cut

into 2cm cubes

2 tsp finely grated lemon rind

1 tbsp chopped fresh oregano

Preheat oven to 160°C (140°C fan-forced). Make a bouquet garni by tying bay leaf, oregano and parsley together with kitchen string, set aside. Toss lamb in seasoned flour until well coated, shake away excess flour. Heat 2tsp oil over medium-high heat in a large casserole dish.

Cook lamb in 2 batches, adding 2tsp more oil between batches, until browned all over. Remove from dish. Add remaining oil to dish and cook onion over medium heat until soft. Add garlic and cook, stirring,

1 minute, or until garlic is aromatic. Add 1/4 cup (60ml) lemon juice to dish and bring to the boil. Cook, stirring, until juice is reduced by about half.

Return all the lamb with any juices to dish. Add bouquet garni, stock and parsnips, stir to combine. Bring to the boil.

Cover and place in oven for 1 1/2 hours or until lamb is very tender.

Place pumpkin on top of the casserole (don't stir through). Cover and cook a further 10 minutes or until pumpkin is tender. Add remaining juice, sprinkle with rind and oregano. Serve with potatoes, if desired.

### Mixed Apple & Berry Sponge Pudding

3 Granny Smith apples, peeled, chopped

2 tablespoons lemon juice, plus 2 teaspoons grated lemon zest

1 1/2 cups (330g) caster sugar

500g frozen mixed berries

2 eggs

1/2 cup (125ml) milk

2 tablespoons whisky

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 cup (150g) plain flour, sifted

1 teaspoon baking powder, sifted

Icing sugar, to dust

Thick cream mixed with 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon, to serve

Preheat oven to 160C. Place the apple, juice and 1 cup (220g) sugar in a small pan and cook over low heat, stirring, for 3 minutes or until the sugar dissolves. Cook for a further 3-4 minutes, stirring occasionally, until apple softens slightly. Cool, then stir through berries. Transfer to a 1.25 litre baking dish. Set aside.


Whisk eggs, milk, whisky, lemon zest and vanilla in a bowl until combined. Set aside. Place fl our, baking powder and remaining sugar in a bowl. Pour egg mixture into dry ingredients, whisking well to form a smooth batter. Pour over fruit, then bake for 30-35 minutes until golden and firm to the touch.

Dust with icing sugar and serve warm with cinnamon cream.



Time to prune the rose bushes and spray with lime sulpher to keep the pests at bay, then fertilise with a slow release fertiliser. Fruit trees should also be pruned and shaped, then sprayed with a copper oxychloride or lime sulpher to protect against curly leaf and fertilised with blood and bone or a slow release fertiliser.

Dose and feed lawns with weed & feed to get rid of the winter grasses


