
PROPOSED WOGOLIN ROAD PLAYGROUND

IN THE KITCHEN



Prune roses, Hydrangea, Crepe Myrtle, Duranta and Plumbago.
Spray Azalea plants with Bayleton to prevent petal blight from ruining the flowering.

Now is the time to plant fruit trees, bare rooted apples, plums, pears.
All need a pollinator to get crosspollination that develops the fruit.

BUTTER CHICKEN BITES

Cooking Oil Spray
½ cup butter chicken simmer sauce
Mango chutney to serve

500g chicken breast fillets, cut into 3cm pieces 250g packet garlic naan bread

Line a large oven tray with baking paper. Spray paper with cooking oil.

Combine chicken and sauce in a large bowl. Toss to coat.

Process bread in a food processor to form fine crumbs. Transfer to a shallow dish.

Working with one piece o chicken at a time, toss in crumbs to coat. Place on prepared tray.

Cook in a hot oven (200C), turning halfway, for about 20 to 25 minutes, until chicken is golden brown and cooked.

Serve with mango chutney.

SNICKERS CARAMEL TART

(Serves 10 - 12, Prep and cook: 40 minutes)

250g packet Choc Ripple biscuits ½ cup roasted salted peanuts

FILLING

395g sweetened condensed milk ½ cup smooth peanut butter

TOPPING

200g dark cooking chocolate, finely chopped

100g unsalted butter, melted 3 x 50g Snickers bars, chopped

4 cup golden syrup75g unsalted butter, chopped

½ cup pure cream

Grease a 23.5 round x 3.5cm deep, loose-base flan tin.

Process biscuits in a food processor until combined. Press mixture firmly over base and up side of prepared pan. Scatter peanuts over base. Refrigerate while preparing filling.

To make filling, place all ingredients in a large saucepan over a medium heat. Stir until butter is melted and mixture is smooth. Bring to boil. Reduce heat to low. Gently boil, stirring constantly for about 2 minutes, or until thickened and light golden. Remove.

Place flan tin on an oven tray. Pour hot filling evenly over peanuts. Smooth over top.

Cook in a moderately slow oven (160C) for about 12 minutes, or until filling is light golden. Remove. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack.

To make topping, place chocolate in a medium heatproof bowl. Heat cream in a small saucepan until hot. Pour over chocolate. Stir until smooth.

Pour topping over filling. Smooth over top. Scatter with Snickers. Refrigerate for about 3 hours or until set. To serve, remove tart from tin. Transfer to a serving plate. Cut into wedges.

"The Best Time to Plant a Tree was 20 Years Ago.... The second Best Time is Now...."Chinese Proverb

Trees are beacons of natural beauty and are remarkably resilient with their ability to adapt and survive. They offer shade to other flora, fauna and surrounding buildings, provide habitats for our fauna and flowers and nectar for birds and insects. A tree in your garden will become a feature, so the wrong tree in the wrong spot can cause structural problems or throw shade where you don't want it. Here are some key points to consider when selecting a tree for your garden:

- 1. Choose a tree well suited to your climate.
- 2. Match the size of your tree to the allotted space-Don't plant big trees in small gardens!
- 3. Decide on Evergreen or Deciduous and whether you want year round shade, autumn colour, winter sunlight, spring blossom, summer colour, fruit or attractive bark; and whether you want an ornamental tree, or a native tree.
- 4. Consider how quickly you want the tree to establish-some are quicker growers than others.
- 5. Avoid placing trees with invasive root systems near buildings or pipes (read up on the tree's capabilities before you buy it or plant it).
- 6. Take care when digging the hole for planting to avoid any underground pipes, and look overhead to make sure you are power-line clear.
- 7. Select a quality tree that is well balanced in trunk and foliage growth, and avoid sick looking and rootbound stock that will compromise the health and safety of the tree.
- 8. Improve soil with compost and/or aged manure, and dig the hole deep and wide enough to accommodate root expansion and growth (usually twice the width and depth of the tree pot). Stake if required until roots become strong enough, and protect with a wind/frost guard for the first couple of years.

9. Care for your tree in the early establishment years with regular watering, fertilising and formative pruning.










