

Shed-anigan Notes

Garden Snippets.....



....Simple Soil Test

The Size and Arrangement of soil particles – what is known as "Soil Texture" – can tell the home gardener if he/she has good or poor soil and indicate remedial action if necessary.

Here is a simple way of finding out what your garden soil is like.

In a round 1 litre jar (or similar size) put about a quarter of a cup of soil and two cups of water. Seal and slosh the mixture for 30 seconds. Let it settle, then slosh again for a further 30 seconds.

Set aside and let it stand until the water clears. This may take up to 3 days, or even a week. Clay takes the longest to settle.

Study the different layers in the bottom of the jar. At the bottom will be the coarsest sand that settled first; then the fine sand; then silt; then clay. Bits of organic matter may be sprinkled over the top or floating in the water.

If it appears to be half sand, it would be called a LIGHT SANDY SOIL


If it is over half silt, with but little clay, it is a HEAVY SILT SOIL

If it is more than 1/4 clay, with a large amount of silt, it is a CLAY SOIL

If it is about 2/5 sand + 2/5 silt and the rest clay, it is GOOD LOAM SOIL - *Ideal*!

LIGHT SANDY SOIL is easy to work, quick to warm up in Spring and usually has good drainage. But it will not hold nutrients or moisture long, and so needs fertiliser and watering more often. To make it more "Moisture and Nutrient Retentive" add organic matter – peat, compost, leaf mould, sawdust.

HEAVY SILT OR CLAY SOILS may be slow to warm and dry out in Spring. They may drain poorly and be compacted easily. Do not work them when wet, or they will form lasting lumps. To make them "Lighter and More Porous", add organic matter – *compost, chopped straw, peat moss, leaf mould, sawdust.* It may also help to dig in quantities of Coarse (not Fine) Sand, such as Pea Gravel or Coarse Perlite.

RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

The restricted burning season commenced 1 October 2020 and goes through to 13 November 2020. This means that no burning can be carried out unless you have a permit from your local Fire Control Officer.

A reminder that if you are reporting a fire you must ring 000, not the shire office. This measure will save valuable time.

The SMS (text) alert service will again be in operation over the coming harvest period.



MAGPIE NESTING SEASON

Magpies breed between August and October each year. Although magpies are quite alarming when they swoop please remember to stay calm – the clap of their wings and clacking of their bill is usually just a bluff. Like a dog, magpies seem to sense fear. The following steps can be followed to avoid or reduce the impact of a swooping magpie:

- Never deliberately provoke a magpie. Throwing sticks or stones usually makes them more defensive.
- Avoid areas where magpies are known to swoop.
- Locate the bird and keep watching it when entering its territory. If you are being swooped don't crouch or stop – continue on your way quickly but don't run.
- If you are riding a bike make sure you wear a helmet, and dismount and walk through nesting magpie territory.
- Try wearing a hat and sunglasses or carry an umbrella for protection, and
- · Remember the magpies are just trying to protect their young.

COVID 19 - NOTICE TO ALL CLUBS (SERVICE OF FOOD)

Serving of Food - during and after events

All clubs must continue to stay aware of Government regulations and advice surrounding this matter, especially in an environment where the situation may change rapidly.

Hygiene Course

All staff and volunteers associated with service of food and/or bar service must complete the required

COVID Hygiene Courses. Details of these courses are available here: https://hospitalityhygiene.com/

COVID Safety Plan

Phase 4 restrictions do require an up-to-date COVID Safety Plan, and the certificate must be on display in your Club. The plan should address the provision of food should the Club plan to do so.

Provision of Meals

It is suggested that all meals, including lunches provided at carnivals, be served individually plated and directly to patrons seated at their table. This should include all elements available on the one individual plate, rather than any "self-service" options like a salad bar or shared plates of food in the middle of tables.

Service directly to the table also avoids lines which are difficult to manage in a COVID friendly manner.

After game snacks

It is recommended that clubs should not be serving shared platters of food (sandwiches, party pies, cheese and biscuits etc) to tables while Phase 4 restrictions are in place. Should Clubs devise a method of serving any of these types of food using an individual serve approach (eg. Individually packaged cheese and biscuits, or sandwiches) then this would be appropriate, but may be a costly solution. At this time it may be prudent to leave this post game offer out until we move to Stage 5 – perhaps a free drink for the opposition may suffice.

Cake stalls etc.

Whilst this may be a popular method of raising funds, it is recommended against the running of cake stalls or other "bring a plate" type events during this time. Unfortunately, the safe and hygienic provision of such items is unable to assured, hence this recommendation.

Sausage Sizzles/Barbecues

Again, avoiding lines and self-service is the advice. So having approved people doing the preparation and then serving the food directly to patrons is the recommendation.

Clearly these are recommendations, with our best advice to simply follow the Government regulations.





WICKEPIN POLICE STATION

It's back to school - remember 40km/h zones

After a fun filled couple of weeks School students will be returning to school on Monday 12th October and the Wickepin Police would like to remind everyone to take extra care and to heed the 40km/h zones around schools as children begin heading back.

As the kids heading back to school will be excited, chattering, looking at their phones, running to catch up to friends or riding their bikes – it's essential that drivers slow down and be vigilant as schools resume again.

With statistics showing that every year police detail a high number of people fined for travelling at more than 40km/h in school zones all of us as road users need to be cautious in school zones, even when doing the correct speed, to ensure that children's lives are protected.

In Western Australia 40km/hr speed zones are in place around schools from 7:30 - 9am in the morning and from 2:30-4pm in the afternoon on school days with research showing that a child hit by a car at 40km/hr has a 75% chance of surviving compared to a child hit at 60km/hr only having a 20% survival rate.

Regional drowning figures back The Nationals push to boost VacSwim

Peter Rundle says an alarming rise in the percentage of drownings in regional WA emphasises the need for greater water education across the State.

He said the disappointing figures in the National Drowning Report 2020 had galvanised The Nationals WA commitment to provide free VacSwim courses for children in regional WA if the Party was returned to Government in March.

"The report painted a tragic picture of actual and near-drownings across regional WA and showed more needs to be done to teach people of the dangers in our waterways," he said.

"Around 57 percent of WA's drowning deaths happened outside the metropolitan area and West Australians were 3.8 times more likely to drown in regional WA – and this is up from 2.3 times in last year's report.

"More needs to be done to ensure children across our regions learn the valuable lessons of water safety to reduce the rate of drownings."

Mr Rundle said The Nationals' VacSwim election policy aimed to increase enrolments from 17,000 participants to 34,000 through an increased number of courses and locations.

"Our commitment also includes increased support to Royal Life Saving WA to train more swimming instructors who can provide these important lessons to children of an early age," he said.

"The sooner our children can be educated about how to respect waterways, beaches and pools then those lessons can stand them in good stead into the future.

"One death by drowning is too many and The Nationals' VacSwim plan provide an important opportunity for more residents in Roe to work, live and play around water in a safe way."

The Nationals WA Leader Mia Davies, who is Vice-Patron of Royal Life Saving WA, said there were 80,000 regional children aged between 5 and 15 years eligible to participate in VacSwim each year but less than a quarter undertook the lessons.

"The Labor Government has made access to VacSwim more difficult for regional families by increasing fees by more than 120 per cent and threatening to remove programs without consulting with local communities," she said.

"VacSwim has been around for more than 100 years, enabling generations to learn and develop water skills and it is important to extend those lessons so regional West Australians can enjoy our waterways for sun, fitness and health."

The Viennese Girl-Jenny Lecoat

In June 1940, the horror-struck inhabitants of Jersey watch as the German army unopposed takes possession of their island. Now only a short way from the English coast, the Germans plan their invasion. Hedy Bercu, a young Jewish girl from Vienna who fled to the isolation and safety of Jersey two years earlier to escape the Nazis, finds herself once more trapped, but this time with no way of escape. Hiding her racial status, Hedy is employed by the German authorities and secretly embarks on small acts of resistance. But most dangerously of all, she falls in love with German lieutenant Kurt Neumann -- a relationship on which her life will soon depend. A remarkable novel of finding hope and love




when all seems at its darkest.

On a Barbarous Coast— Craig Cormick and Harold Ludwick

On a Barbarous Coast is an alternative retelling of Captain James Cook's story co-written by Craig Cormick and Harold Ludwick in the tradition of imagined histories. Watching these mysterious white beings, the Guugu Yimidhirr people cannot decide if they are ancestor spirits to be welcomed - or hostile spirits to be speared. One headstrong young boy, Garrgiil, determines to



do more than watch and to be the one to find out what exactly they are. Fierce, intriguing and thoughtful, On a Barbarous Coast is the story of a past and future that might have been.

Adult Fiction

The Fogging—Luke Horton

A compelling tale of the slow disintegration of a relationship and the unravelling of a man. Tom and Clara are two struggling academics in their mid-thirties, who decide to take their first holiday in ten years. On the flight over to Indonesia, Tom experiences a debilitating panic attack, something he hasn't had in a long time, which he keeps hidden from Clara. At the resort, they meet Madeleine, a charismatic French woman, her Australian partner, Jeremy, and five-year-old son, Ollie, and the two couples strike up an easy friendship. The holiday starts to look up, even to Tom, who is struggling to get out of his own head. But when



Clara and Madeleine become trapped in the maze-like grounds of the hotel during 'the fogging' — a routine spraying of pesticide — the dynamics suddenly shift between Tom and Clara, and the atmosphere of the holiday darkens.

Wild Your Garden: Create a sanctuary for nature—Jim and Joel Ashton

If we all made space for wildlife in our garden, we'd transform levels of biodiversity and help combat wildlife habitat loss, plummeting pollinator numbers, and carbon emissions. But it's not just a question of letting the weeds take over - there's an art and balance to rewilding a garden well so that you can enjoy it too. The Butterfly Brothers are experts at designing wildlife-friendly gardens, and in Wild Your Garden, they show you how to work with nature, support wildlife, and create a self-maintaining, no-dig balance of planting. Transform a paved-over yard into a lush oasis, create




refuges to welcome endangered species, or change a high-maintenance lawn into a minimeadow with the potential to absorb carbon and air pollution.
