IRENE MOORE'S RETIREMENT

Irene grew up in Bullaring and went to Narrogin High. She went to Kalgoorlie to do her general nursing training before going to Tasmania to do her midwifery.

Now as a double certificated nurse she had plenty of opportunities available to her. She worked at Bunbury and Narrogin.

Irene used to visit her cousin Reg Davenport (and Ella) in Wickepin where she met and eventually married Chris in 1974 and came to Wickepin. They lived in the cottage up at Ron Hemley's.

Irene worked at the Narrogin Regional hospital maternity ward until she started her family.

Irene started her journey through Wickepin Health by relieving Matron Steve Davies for holidays, health checks etc and escorted the last permanent patient from the Wickepin Hospital to the Nursing Home in Narrogin when the hospital closed, was modified and became the Wickepin Nursing Post.

Irene was working at the time Steve died and was offered the job. However, she was not ready to work full time as she was still a full time mum to Melissa and Daniel.

Betty Hanekamp was the next person in charge and Irene continued to do relief work for her. Irene took on the shared position with Norma Sinclair when Betty retired about 1987. With no one using the residence they were able to spread out and the Child Health nurse who had been at the CWA rooms joined them. There was at that time a visiting doctor. The Earl Street practice had been sending their newest doctor out until they became too busy and they stopped. Dr Parry was interested in the surrounding towns and agreed to send someone out. Dr Beaton was one of those who came out. He states that he missed and had enjoyed his visits too.

When WACHS took over the HACC programme from the shire, Maggie Lally as the co-ordinator came too. Just for interest sake Maggie Lally was the first HACC co-ordinator at Wickepin and started about 1989 retiring about 2000.

Along with Maggie came the support workers; Bev Chapman, Helen Bunter, Hazel Green, Jessie Davey, Judy Bransby. Judy used to push Renae in a pusher up to Mrs Keogh's about 27 years ago.

Around this time Wickepin became part of the Primary Health team with Angela Corrigan as the Primary Health Manager, and Wendy Butler and Sharon Sutherland joined the team job sharing the Administration Officer's role. (Both had young children).

The Wickepin Health Board was formed with Syd Martin as chairman. Others on the board at some time were Colin Hemley Judy Lang, Esther Fulford, Tina Simpson, Bill English and Colin Russell.

Irene Moore's Retirement (cont'd)

They were an active board and had a lot of input especially in relocating HACC from the shire and in the building of the present Health Centre.

Robyn Vaughan replaced Maggie as HACC co-ordinator.

When Norma left and went to a position at Williams Rhona Fleay and Kelly (now Miller) job shared this position about (1999).

There was the transition to the new health centre and we had been in that building for some time before The Honourable Kim Chance opened the building on February 25th 2004.

When Robyn Vaughan resigned the HACC job became incorporated in the Senior nurse's role.

In 2008 Irene resigned from the nurse's role and remained solely the HACC coordinator. The job then was very different and Irene was the person who assessed what were services were delivered and to whom. Now it is done by an outside agency and is much stricter.

Other staff members along the way. Ruth Bailey worked mainly in the transport role from 2004-2014. Wendy Meddings has been on the staff for more than 10 years. Christine Sachs worked with us for quite a few years. Danielle Riley has just finished -short period, Chris Lozenicens is our most versatile staff member. We have had quite a few others who did not stay very long.

We digress from Wickepin Health to St John Ambulance.

Irene joined the St John Ambulance Brigade which was a uniformed division and did not have much to do with ambulances but mainly did training and competitions. Irene joined this in 1978 and her training record starts in 1989.

She also trained as an ambulance officer for the emergency use of the ambulance and was on call.

The people of Wickepin had a different mindset when it came to the services of the town. When anybody got ill or had an accident after hours they called Irene who would attend to their needs and when an ambulance was needed she would call either Tom Sands or Phil Watson and ask them to bring the ambulance. The people seemed to think that Irene was on duty 24 hours a day. Thank you Irene for looking after us all those years as I am sure I would have gone to you myself or with my children.

Irene also on behalf of St Johns taught many First Aid courses from 1996. I remember when she first started she was very nervous but became a very good First Aid teacher. This as with the ambulance officer work meant many extra hours of attending qualification courses.

The other thing Irene did at all hours was sign papers in her capacity as Justice of the Peace. She became a JP in 1991 and gives very freely of her services in this capacity.

A big Thank you from the people you have worked with, the clients you have had along the way and the Wickepin community in general.

Eulogy of Doug Martin

When it comes time for us to leave this earth, everyone will have a different measure of their successes and failures. We all have different memories and interpretation of the events that occur, so I would like to remember Dad's successes as I see them, and the impression these events left on me.

Dad spoke often of his parents and siblings. He spoke of good times he had with Geoff and also with Syd and Glennis. There were hard times as well and he worked hard as a very young boy, but seemed happy to do so. I believe Dad and Geoff's ability to cart loads of grain was legendary. He told stories of the depression years when times were tough, and food was short. He and Nana would take the ferrets down to the rabbit holes, in the hope they would scare the rabbits out of the holes and on to the dining table. Many people's drive and determination were impacted by those particularly hard times. Dad was certainly one of them.



Dad loved his football, both playing and watching. He still has trophies he won and recently I found a card where he was awarded fairest and best for that year. He treasured these achievements. He told us stories of games that were played and carnivals that were won. In later years when watching the modern game he would say the game had changed so much.

Dad loved Mum to bits. He would often tell me of the time he first saw her at the Yealering Boxing Day Sports Day. He was on the start line for a race and looked up to see this beautiful lady with long black hair. They fell in love and together they worked to achieve all sorts of milestones, raising a family, developing and extending the farm in all areas and making the best of their lives. I saw this firsthand as we worked together during Swine Flu and Kara's illness. They were unrelenting in their support of their family. I loved it when Mum was cooking a meal or just not attending to what was happening around her, Dad would give her a cuddle. Mum was devoted to Dad as well. She constantly cared for him. After he was admitted to care Mum beat a well worn path down the hill to be with him. She made sure they had the same connection in the relationship as they had started 68 years ago. She honoured her vows for better or worse, in sickness and in health to the very end.

Difficult times on the farm, be it prices, drought, too much rain, high bank interest, were able to test, but not break their love, or stop the pursuit of their goals. They were a team. They worked together. It made an impression on us. It made us feel safe. It made us aware that home was that place we could go to if we needed it. We were able to witness the feelings good times can bring, which is easy, but more especially the effort that is required in tough times, and the sense of achievement and strength you gain from changing a bad situation into a good result.

Dad loved being a farmer. He could recall when sheds were built, fences were erected, dams were sunk, machinery was bought, it filled him with pride and was a visual reminder of achievements. That's the thing about the land it is a constant visual reminder. He would talk about these milestones, and listening, I realized how important it is to have that pride in what you do. I remember Dad ploughing the front paddock at Crystal Brook when he was 91. Brett said he did a perfect job. He always loved to see the ploughed paddocks and their contrast with the green.

His passion and compassion for the livestock on the farm was amazing. He was extremely conscientious in their care and welfare. If an animal had to be brought home because it was unwell, he would spend hours, days if not weeks, trying to bring them back to health and give them another chance. We had pet lambs and they never received an ear tag so they spent their whole life on the farm.

He was very proud of his children and their achievements. We were offered many opportunities. He liked hearing music in the house and loved dancing. Many rounds of the dance floor were had at cabarets and local dances. We would sing songs on the way home from dances. "Show me the way to go home" and "Daisy, Daisy" were favourites. I remember when Brett was born. We got the phone call and found out we had a brother and Dad had a son. He would sit down and play farms with Brett after he finished work, regardless of how tired he was.

He enjoyed his time in the army. He would always talk about Melbourne and the places he would drive to and from. He always treasured memorabilia from that time. It would have challenged him going from a small community to a big city. He talked of some bad situations he saw, however, he succeeded and came home with a different attitude. I think it gave him the chance to realise "how the other half live".

In many ways, Dad, no doubt with Mum's support, was ahead of the times. Being female wasn't even seen as a barrier to achieving whatever you wanted to be. When we got our cars we had to be able to change the tyres, oil, and air filters. I have always wondered if he thought of Women's Equality long before it was Politically Correct to talk about. We were all given educational opportunities and supported to be the best we could be. Individuality was not only supported, but encouraged, so long as the decision that was made was carried through. Brett and Dad worked together and it was something that made Dad's life complete. I have no doubt of the regard and respect that was developed over the years.

Dad had a simple yet complete life. It runs in contrast with today's world where technology, in some cases has created a world of some discontent. Dad created his life through family, achievements and memories. Maybe that's a lesson we may think about. As you are the author of your journey, make your own story, your own way and it is possible to do this with not a Tweet, Instagram, or Facebook page in sight.

The day we left him at Jeremiah Donovan Village was one of the most difficult days I can remember. In the nearly 3 years he was there he never complained, never asked to go home, never made me feel guilty or responsible for his situation. Whether it was true or not he would say "I'm good, I'm happy". After an outing as we arrived back to the village he would say "Home Sweet Home". He and Mum went on bus trips and saw many parts of Perth never visited before. It was during this period of time that I saw Dad's resilience and strength of character at its strongest.

It has been an honour to bring Dad home one more time. To leave us from the one place in the world he loved the most, from the place that he and Mum created and shared. From the house he made the bricks for and helped to build, to the surrounds they worked at to develop. As Mum said when they arrived at the farm there was nothing. We are so proud of them.

I have come to believe that the real wealth you have in life is rarely in the form of a bank balance, but the memories and impressions you leave behind, for others to base their lives and values on. Dad has left us with individual and different memories, most of which were done with the best of intention. I hope when my time comes Daniel and Alex will be able to think that even the mistakes I made were done with the best of intentions. Over the years I have literally met thousands of parents. I have listened to them making comments about things that happened in their childhood and what should or should not have happened. I would always come to the same conclusion. I wanted my children to have the same feeling of security, same direction, respect for effort and regard for the importance of family, as I was given.

Rest easy Dad, a job well done. We are sad you have left us and we realize you stayed for as long as you could. Thanks for the memories and love you showed us. Your greatest success, your family, will continue to live their lives using your love and values as a guiding light.

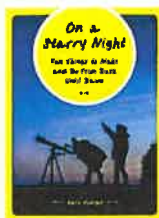
Adult Fiction Jill Mansell - **And Now You're Back**

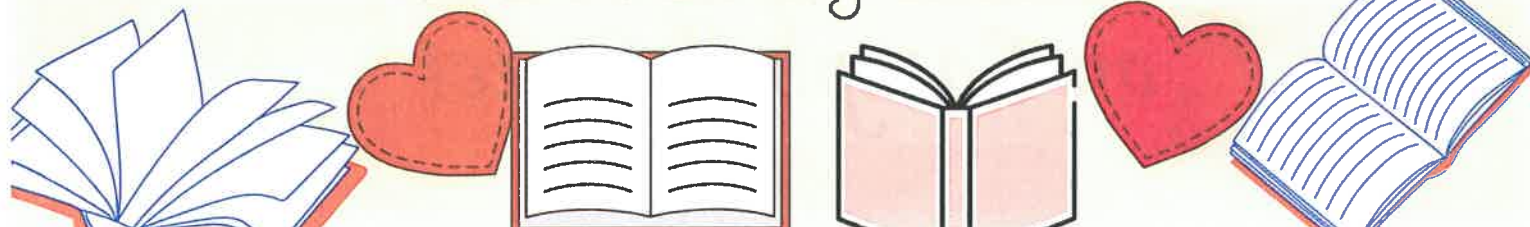

Fun Things to Make and Do From Dusk Until Dawn

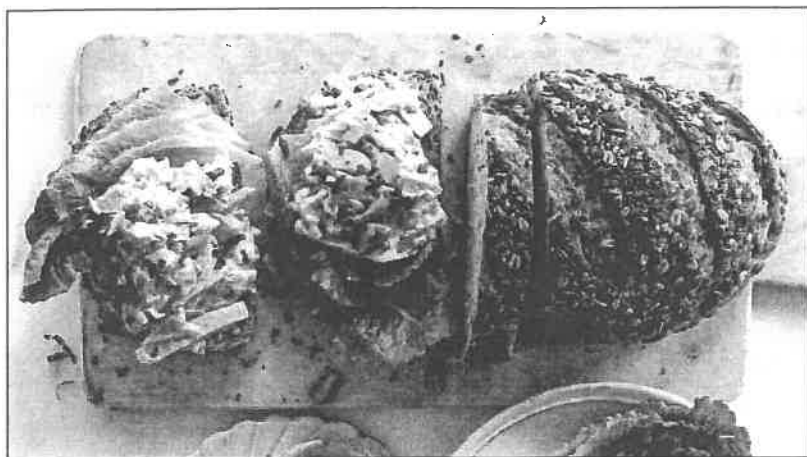

IN THE KITCHEN



TUNA SALAD SANDWICH

Ingredients

8 slices quality soy and linseed bread

butter: as much as you like (I like a lot!)

2 baby gem lettuces, pulled apart, washed and dried

For the tuna salad

425g canned tuna in oil, drained

2 sticks celery, finely diced

12 Gordal olives (large, plump Spanish ones), pitted, roughly chopped

80g mayonnaise

3 sprigs flat-leaf parsley, finely chopped

½ red onion, finely diced

½ dill pickle, finely diced

sea salt and freshly ground white pepper

Method

1. To make the salad, flake the tuna into a bowl, add all remaining ingredients and fold to combine. Taste and adjust seasoning as necessary.

2. Spread eight bread slices evenly with butter. Add lettuce leaves to four of them and spoon over the tuna salad. Top with the remaining slices to enclose the filling. Slice in half and serve immediately.

Garden Snippets...



Autumn Transplanting...

If you have been hankering to move a plant, Now is one of the best times of the year to do it. Air temperatures have dropped so the plants will be less stressed, but soils are still warm, which assists with root development. When transplanting your treasured trees and shrubs, a bit of forethought, planning and preparation is the way to go.

Here's some tips for success:

Prepare the Plant: Transplant death is usually due to a loss of root mass and the resulting dehydration of the plant. Therefore, two weeks beforehand, water the plant with a seaweed solution. Water again a week before, and then the day before the move. This will prepare the plant to cope with the imminent stress of moving, and already have it in "root development mode". Watering it the day before ensures the plant is fully turgid at transplant time.

New Hole: Dig and prepare a new hole where the plant is going before moving the plant. This minimises the time the plant is out of the ground, especially if the plant is difficult to dig out of it's original site, and therefore the rootball is less exposed to drying out. If the soil is dry in the new hole fill it with water and allow it to drain through.

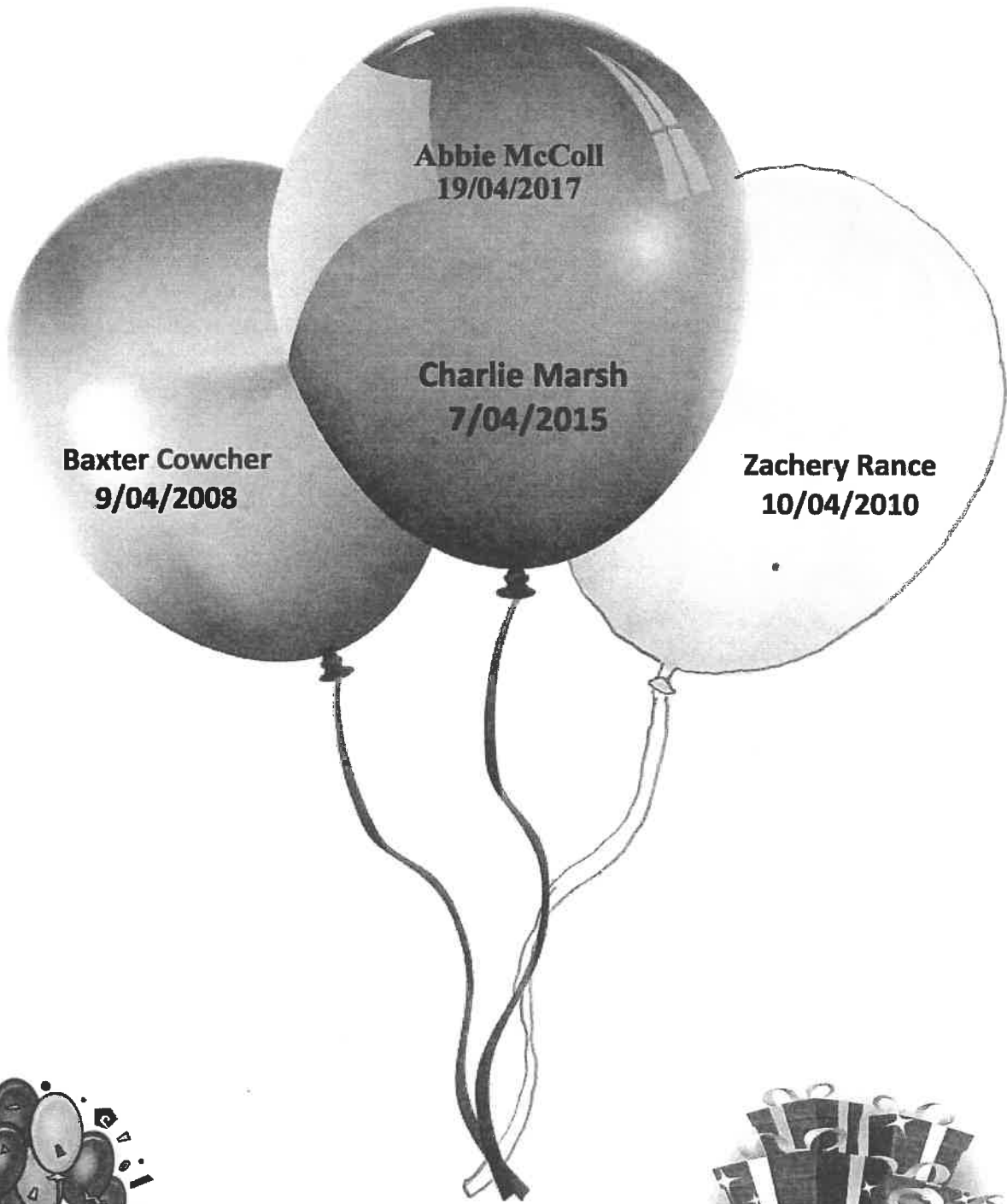
Dig Plant Out: Work your way around the plant with your garden spade, maintaining as large a rootball as possible. Don't be tempted to do half a dig and then yank the plant out as this will tear the roots and greatly disturb the rootball. Once out, check the outside of the rootball and trim back any roots that have jagged edges - sharp, clean cuts will heal faster. Wrap the rootball in hessian to hold it together and minimise drying out while it is in transit. Handle the plant by the rootball instead of the trunk to avoid damage to the trunk.

Planting Time: Check your new hole is the correct depth and width to accommodate the rootball. The plant should sit at the same soil level as before, and have a minimum 10cm spacing between the rootball and the sides of the hole in order for new roots to not be in immediate contact with hard compacted soil. Remove the hessian and gently put the plant into the hole. Step back and look at it from several angles to ensure you are happy with the positioning. Backfill and push the soil down as you go to minimise large air pockets, then water in well so that soil properly settles around the rootball, adding more soil, if need be, to the original level.

Pruning: Even with the best of care, the plant will be left with a reduced amount of roots. Pruning some foliage by 20 to 30 per cent will reduce water loss and help to restore the balance of roots to leaves.

Aftercare: Plants will need weekly watering for the first month to get them properly established. Don't fertilise until they produce some new growth under their own steam. Protect from hot sun, frost and strong wind by using shade cloth tied to garden stakes, placed around the base of the plant. Look out for the wobbles and if the plant is unstable in it's new position, then support with garden stakes for a few months until new anchor roots develop.
