

Eulogy-Cyril O'Brien

Cyril was born on 4th August 1928, a home birth in Subiaco to his parents John and Ileen. He was one of 7 children, 3 brothers and 3 sisters, the younger twins Connie and Pam being his only remaining siblings.

The family moved to North Perth where Cyril attended North Perth Primary school before enrolling in Christian Brothers in Highgate. Upon passing his leaving he gained a small scholarship and went to university for 2 years studying engineering. Unfortunately, Cyril's family could not afford for him to continue his studies, so he worked at the Crown Law Department for the next few years. Whilst in Perth, Cyril was a keen high diver and a member of the surf lifesaving, competing in triathlons at Triggs.

With friends Peter Sugar and Ray McDonald (better known as Moey) Cyril set out for a working holiday to Queensland. They picked up work making cement bricks for houses in Wickepin and Yealering then Cyril began working for Colin Shipley and started seasonal shearing. His first day of shearing saw him shear just 12 sheep!

In 1951 he played football for Dudinin and in 1952 transferred to Yealering FC. One of his proudest footy achievements was winning the Kelly Medal in the Northam Football Carnival along with two fairest and best medals in the local football association.

According to Jean, one day while working in the Co-op, 3 young men strolled in. One of the girls said the first one is mine (tall, dark, and handsome), the other girl baggsed the second one who was a blonde, so Jean said... "I guess I've got the little one at the back!"

Cyril and Jean were married in 1956 while working for Ted Dalton, when he was asked to go back onto wages. Cyril chose to leave and spent the next 12 months contract fencing and shearing. At this time Tim Doncon approached him to manage a farm at Albany but when this fell through, he introduced Cyril to Tom Hewitt who was looking for someone to lease his farm at Malyalling with the option to purchase, and so life began for them both on Lambton Downs. Soon after, their sons arrived, Graham then Keith, completing their family.

Life on the farm was very hard as they were always short of money, but they persevered weathering the storms. One year Cyril had said to Jean "I think we are done for" as they were struggling to make ends meet. Then he got the idea to cut jam posts out of the bush and sell them. An ad was placed in the local paper, and they received so many phone calls that they had to employ someone to help cut the logs, while they loaded the trucks.

Four Winds was purchased just before the interest rates rose to 24% and they were then forced to sell it to continue farming Lambton Downs.

Farming and married life held many happy memories for Cyril and Jean.

In the beginning they had pigs, poultry, a cow for milking, sheep, grew their own veggies and had fruit trees so they were very self-sufficient as you had to be.

In the early days Cyril's father would come down to the farm. He was always eager to help and this day they were dipping sheep in a plunge dip of arsenic. Pop insisted on helping push the sheep in and yes.... in he went. Luckily, he was a tall man, and his head didn't go under. He didn't volunteer for that job again. He also would tighten all the gates so hard; Cyril couldn't open them.

One day Colin (Jeans' brother) and Cyril decided to sell scrap metal. They had to blow up the cast iron to break it up for sale. 1 or 2 sticks of dynamite too many sent the metal pieces flying past the boys sheltering behind a tree at least 200 metres away.

At a young age, Jean's brother Colin passed away leaving a young family in Kylie and Andrew without their dad. Cyril and Jean took them both in and cared for them for the first 6 months and then each year they would come back to the farm for the holidays. Andrew always left a parting gift of shorting the electric fence to the gate so Cyril would get a shock when he went to open it.

Their social outlet from the farm was sport, always involved in the local football, tennis, golf and bowling clubs over their lifetime. Many tennis tournaments and country weeks enabled them to travel all over the state meeting and making many friends. Cyril and Jean also loved the dances they attended every weekend with Charlie Rose playing the piano in the Wickepin Hall and at Gillimanning. Their holidays were spent in Albany in the early days then Mandurah when the boys were older. The 1st trip to Albany was in the truck with Graham on the seat and Keith in a cardboard box with a mattress.

Later, Graham married Robyn and Keith married Sandra. The first grandchild, Rheannon arrived in 1983, followed by Kymberlee, Callum, Matthew, Trent and then the final surprise Joshua.

And just when we all thought the grand children were the apple of Cyril's eye, the Great grandchildren arrived. Xavier was the first to arrive in February 2011 and from this day, a new bond was formed of adoration.

Over the years, the great grandchildren continued to grow, and in total there are 7, with 6 great grandsons and 1 great granddaughter. It was only 8 weeks ago, whilst Cyril & Jean were in respite in Brookton that Tristan happened to be playing a hockey game there. They were like two school children, Chris remembers, both Cyril & Jean, waiting at the door, then they were in the car, and off to watch Tristan in action.

O'Brien family Christmases were always ones to remember. There was sure to be water involved or the annual cricket/table tennis grudge matches, and everyone was always aware that Pop was bar lease. Being that we are not a competitive family, no issues ever arose. Pop always cast a watchful eye over these games and sat at what we thought was arm's length. Low & behold, a smashing cover drive by Trent saw the ball cannon into Pop's drink and wind him. The crowd went silent and gasped, and Pop said, 'I'm ok!' We all breathed a sigh of relief.

As time took a toll on his body, his mind was astute as ever. He could reel off figures and dates and had a memory like an elephant. His sense of humour remained until the very end, as, while he was in hospital there was a loud clattering when someone dropped a metal tray. Cyril's comment was, 'I thought I was the one meant to be kicking the bucket!'

Cyril was a hardworking and caring gentleman who had an unwavering love for Jean. Every day of his 67 years of marriage he adored her, laughed and cried with her and was dedicated to her totally. He devoted his life to her, and his family and we will always cherish our memories of him. He was in his happy place, whenever his family was near. He & his beloved Jean were never far apart.......

When IRIS Eyes Are Smiling...

Iris' come up gaily and naturally in almost every part of the world, including Australia. They are hardy, evergreen perennials, and there are three species - Rhizomatous; Bulbous-rooted and Tuberous-rooted. These are further divided into several sections, the main ones being Tall bearded; Dwarf bearded; Beardless; Cushion; Japanese; Tuberous-rooted and Bulbous.

Tall Bearded Iris like to grow in sunny borders amongst other perennials, or planted out in beds by themselves. They like an ordinary, well-drained soil with plenty of lime. Each autumn give a top dressing of lime, then in spring fertilize with superphosphate. If using animal manure make sure it is well aged as fresh animal manure may cause the rhizome to rot. Plant the rhizome firmly with the top part protruding above the soil surface. Cut the Foliage down in autumn so that sun can bake the rhizomes and keep them from rotting over winter. Soil should be kept friable and not allowed to become hard or sodden. Lift and divide every 4 years, and plant out anytime between December and May, the earlier the better.

Dwarf Bearded Iris have the same cultivation as the taller variety but prefer to grow in full sunshine and be very well drained. They can be used for permanent edgings; massed in groups in borders and rock gardens; or used as ground covers on dry banks.

Beardless Iris come in many forms. Some like ordinary rich soil and full sunshine, whilst other species like wet conditions and will grow along the margins of ponds and streams. The Little Crested Iris likes a deep soil with plenty of humus and grows best in half shade, whilst the lime-hating Californian Iris have very fine thread-like roots, are hard to transplant, and are mostly grown from seed.

Cushion Iris are also known as the Regalia Section, as many of them come from Turkey or Turkestan. These love good drainage and plenty of sun and include the Mourning Iris.

Japanese Iris have large, flat flowers often 25cm across. They have fibrous roots, so they don't store water in rhizomes during dry spells as do the previously mentioned species of Iris. They do best growing at the edges of ponds with their roots in shallow water. They can be grown in garden beds, rock gardens or sunken gardens, so long as they get plenty of water. These Iris send leaves straight up from their fibrous roots before new roots are established in spring, when watering and careful attention is a must should there be a dry spell.

Tuberous-Rooted Iris come from the monsoon area of south-east Asia and consist of only two species that are quite different from any other Iris. These plants have a small tuberous root protected by the fibre from the old leaves from previous years. Thick, white roots grow out from these tubers, rather like Alstroemeria roots. They must be grown in very well drained soil, as they don't like too much water in winter, but they also need thorough periodic watering in summer, so a good place to plant them is underneath overhanging eaves. Flowers are in sprays of three on a stem, which open in succession, each one only lasting eight hours.

Bulbous Iris are mostly European in origin and include the English, Spanish and Dutch Iris, and the early flowering Reticulatas and Tingitanas, many of which have been crossed, giving a great number of varieties. These bulbs like a well drained, friable soil in an open position, and look attractive in bold colour groups or in mass plantings along borders. Dutch iris need to be planted 7.5cm deep, whereas English iris have larger bulbs so should be planted deeper. For Spring flowering, bulbs should be planted in Autumn; and for Autumn flowering, bulbs must be planted in Spring or early Summer.

You **MUST** be registered with a brigade to receive a uniform.

Townsite Properties

In the coming weeks Shire Officers will be inspecting all townsites within the Shire of Wickepin and will be issuing notices to residence of unsightly properties.

This includes but is not limited to long grass, motor vehicles, general rubbish, etc. Failure to comply with these notices will result in the land owner being issued with a fine.

You will need to provide the location of the fire to the Operator who will then contact our Chief Bush Fire Control Officer who will alert the Fire Control Officers.

Dog Control - Registrations Now Due

Council has recently received a number of complaints in relation to roaming dogs. It is an owners responsibility to keep their dog limited to their properly unless being walked on a leash.

The Dog Act requires all dogs to be registered with the shire if it is three (3) months or older. The registration period is 1 November to 31 October, registration renewals for 2023/2024 will be issued soon. All dogs must be microchipped before registration. Copies of microchipping papers must be provided on registration.

All dogs found roaming will be impounded and the owners fined. For the release of an unregistered dog the registration must be paid along with the fine.

Works have near completion on the construction of the new skate park and half-court basketball court which will be incorporated into the new nature playground.




The fence surrounding the site has now been dismantled, however it is advised to refrain from using the facility until all works are completed.



MIA'S LOCAL HERO GRANTS ROUND OPENS

13th October 2023

The latest round of 'Mia's Local Hero Grants' has been opened to eligible groups and individuals living in the electorate of Central Wheatbelt.

It is the eighth round of the small grant funding program provided by Hon Mia Davies MLA.

"These small grants are designed to support groups and people in the electorate who work hard to support and inspire their community," Ms Davies said.

"This round of the program will provide amounts of up to \$200 for local groups who support and enrich our communities."

Ms Davies said the grants provided an opportunity to show her support, thanks and appreciation for the hardworking volunteer and not-for-profit organisations that make such a difference in our community.

"I encourage everyone that is eligible to make an application as it's hotly contested and there are many deserving projects, people and event in the electorate," Ms Davies said.

"The funds could be used to support or sponsor a local event, contribute toward the purchase of new equipment or materials, or to assist your group to better support your members or community.

"I'm looking forward to receiving the applications, and if anyone has concerns about their eligibility, they should contact my office."

Successful applicants from the previous round include bringing a qualified swim instructor to Mukinbudin for the Swimming Club, purchasing photography light display boxes for the Narembeen Historical Society and personal protective equipment for the Pingelly Youth Cadets.

"The funding also contributed to new trestles for the Nungarin Wheatbelt Markets as the Committee celebrated their 25th anniversary this year, new roller-skates for the Wylie Roller-skating team and a 'come and try day' for York & District Archery Club.

Cut veggies up in bite sized pieces and cook in wok for 5 mins or so.


Cut up Chicken in bite sized pieces also and add to the pan – cook a further 5 mins.

Blueberry Muffins

Ingredients

2 cups self-raising flour

34 cup caster sugar

1 egg beaten

¼ cup vegetable oil

1 cup milk

125 g blueberries fresh or frozen

2 tabs raw sugar (optional) for sprinkling.

Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees celsius fan-forced (200 if using conventional).
- 2. Line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper muffin cases or grease well.
- 3. Sift the self-raising flour into a large bowl. Add the caster sugar and stir together. Create a well in the centre.
- 4. In a separate bowl, whisk together the egg, oil and milk.
- 5. Pour the liquid into the well and very gently fold the mixture together (the batter should be slightly lumpy do not over-mix).
- 6. Very gently fold through the blueberries (do not over-mix).
- 7. Spoon the mixture into the muffin cases (fill $\frac{1}{2}$ to the top).
- 8. Sprinkle each muffin with raw sugar (optional).
- 9. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until lightly golden.
- 10. Allow to cool in the baking tray for 5 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.





Quad bikes are not children's toys

With the warmer weather and people spending more time outdoors, a reminder that quad bikes and kids are a dangerous, and potentially deadly, mix.

Since 2020, nine West Australians have been killed on quad bikes - two of them this year, including a girl aged under 10. Nationally, quad bikes are a leading cause of serious injury and death on Australian farming properties with 71 people killed, including 11 children, since 2017.

Royal Perth Hospital's Trauma Register shows the majority of quad bike accidents between 2013 and 2022 happened off-road or on farms. 60 per cent of 80 people admitted to Royal Perth Hospital with major trauma injuries from quad bike accidents, weren't wearing any safety devices.

Accidents are common with quad bikes tipping and easily rolling over on rough ground, at high speed or carrying heavy or uneven loads, often resulting in devastating outcomes.

Quad bike safety is improving with new rules introduced in late 2021, covering operator protection devices, and a tag that allows you to compare stability and safety of models.

But quad bikes are not children's toys. Perth Children's Hospital has seen 14 children, aged 15 years and younger, injured in quad bike accidents between January and August this year.

The safest option is for children not to ride quads, even as passengers, as children lack the size, and physical or cognitive ability to safely operate quad bikes built for adults.

The <u>Product Safety Australia website</u> has a range of great ways to increase safety on quad bikes for older riders and passengers, based around **Prepare Safe**, **Wear Safe**, **Ride Safe**.

Among the recommendations, **Prepare Safe** advises to make sure the quad is the right vehicle for the activity you want to do. **Wear Safe** is all about wearing a helmet and protective clothing, and **Ride Safe** includes advice on not carrying passengers on bikes designed for only one rider.

The figures speak for themselves. Keep kids off quad bikes these holidays, to keep them safe.





Thanks to the committee for a successful year and a special thankyou to Alyce Tropiano who has been our VP for the last two years and dear friend to many of us.


Alyce is off with her family to live the farming lifestyle in Mullewa next year and we will miss her wonderful defensive skills and better organisational skills.
