



The Shire of Wickepin welcomes community participation during public question time. Members of the public are able to ask questions relating to the business of the Council.



Ellen Evelyn Walton – Eulogy 9.2.1928 – 9-10-2023



Life is a magnificent tapestry woven with threads of joy and sorrow, triumphs and challenges, love, and loss. The journey of Ellen's life is filled with countless experiences that shaped who she was......

Ellen, affectionately known by family and friends as Nell or Nellie, was born in the Wickepin Hospital on the 9^{th of} February 1928 to parents William and Evelyn Tahn (nee Bell). Living about a mile and a half out of Wickepin, her parents would walk along the railway line into town for shopping. Nell was carried on her father's shoulders; the shop owner often gave her mum a bag of boiled lollies.... Nell always believed that is why she had a sweet tooth!

Later they took up a block of virgin sandplain that adjoined her Nanna and Poppa Bell's farm near the Rabbit Proof fence north of the 76 Gate. This was later sold to Reg Dunwell. During this time Nell's sister Betty was born. As youngsters, Nell and Betty would go with their dad as he cleared the block. She loved the smell of the crushed gum leaves when a large tree was felled. She used to run and look at the bright soft leaves on the top of the tree. She wrote in one of her many journals:

"Dad always gave me a stern warning about where I must stand when he started to chop down a tree. I can still hear the sound, of that penetrating click, of an axe in the bush."

Rabbits were trapped and the government paid a bounty for all fresh skins. The rabbits were a frequent part of their diet, baked or stewed.

The family made frequent visits to her Nanna and Poppa Bell's farm, walking 2 miles through the scrub from where they lived. Her Aunty Jesse was much the same age as Nell, and they were often dressed like twins. She played dolls with Jesse and learned how to embroider, which is something she enjoyed doing throughout her life, examples of which can be seen in the display. They loved to sit on Poppa Bell's knee as he sang to them. Nell recalled his dear old face, and him getting out of breath, when they demanded too many songs.

Poppa Bell would make the girls shepherd the sheep. They would sit on the ponies and read books or do some embroidery, waiting for the chance to gallop across the paddock to round up straying sheep.

With Jessie, Nell commenced school at Sewells Rock, which was a one room school for infants to standard 6. There were around 14 students and their teacher's name were Myrtle Smith. For the first year of their schooling Nell's Aunty Rene, who later married Les Jackson, took them both to school with a horse and sulky. Later they rode their own ponies and Nell told many stories about how her stubborn pony would deliberately line up low lying branches to try and knock her off.

Later the government gave a fuel allowance to parents, so her dad and Poppa Bell paid the teacher who then transported them to school.

According to Nell, Miss Smith was nice but very strict about the lessons and homework and would apply the ruler if needed. Nell loved school and her passion for reading, writing and a love of history and nature was ignited here. She recalled Buster Dawes often bringing lizards and other wildlife he'd caught on his way to school to show them. Embroidery was also taught, however if the stitches weren't just right, they had to be pulled out straight away.

In 1942, during the 2nd world war, the family moved to Bayswater in Perth. Her father, who prior to emigrating from England, had an aeronautics engineering background and wanted to enlist in the RAAF. Unfortunately, he failed the medical due to an injured knee so was given a job in charge of the machine shop at the Australian National Airways. Nell was enrolled in a business college and when she completed her course, she commenced her first job at the same place as her father operating the switchboard and checking time sheets.

Later Nell commenced a new job at the taxation department in St Georges Terrace. The job entailed assessing peoples' income to calculate their tax. She was expected to do a minimum of 200 assessments a day – using her brain to work out the long sums, with no calculators or computers.

Although they had regular air raid practices and food and petrol rations, to her, the war seemed far away. She joined an Anglican Church youth club, which organised dances and picnics. Here she met a dear lifelong friend, Thelma Abott and her dad would often take them to the beach on Sundays, and sometimes on a summers' evening they would walk to Maylands and attend outdoor movies. Around this time, 1944, the family welcomed a baby boy, Jimmy, bringing much joy to the family.

When the war ended in 1945 government jobs became a priority for ex -service men therefore, her job ended at the tax department. Soon after the family decided to return to Yealering to live, with her dad buying Frank Harris's black smith shop, which was situated near Coxon's garage.

Nell was given a job, as librarian, by the co-op manager of the time, Mr Arthur Kelly. The library was set up in a small room in the co-op building. It was Nell's job to varnish the covers and number and index each book. It cost 5 pence to borrow a book and one of her most regular customers was Pat Shipley who would ride her bike into town nearly every day.

During this time Nell met Bernard Walton who, had also returned to Yealering after being manpowered as a shearer up north for the war effort. He was working for and living with the local carrier Fred Coxon and his family.

In March 1947 Nell and Bernie were married. For two and a half years they lived in Perth in a small flat in St Georges Terrace. Bernie worked for Sydney Atkins while Nell worked for an insurance company. After this period, they returned to Yealering, Bernie taking up shearing again around the district and helping his father, Albert Walton, on his farm called Rockyridge.

For five years they lived in Woodbine cottage, which Albert had transported from the Goldfields for use while Bernie was attending Yealering Primary School. The cottage was situated west of the school. Their first son Glenn, was born in 1951, followed by Chris in 1953. Around 1958 the family swapped houses and moved to the Rockyridge homestead and Albert retired to Woodbine Cottage.

This was one of the happiest times for Nell, as she loved farm life and activities in nearby Yealering. She would drive into town in the Whippet, the family would joke about the fact that she could drive ten miles to town, on a corrugated road, in less than ten minutes, and yet, according to her, had not gone over 50 miles per hour!

In her journal she wrote, "They were wonderful times for us all, local balls not to be missed, the large lake welcoming us on hot days and trains bringing crowds of people from Narrogin and Corrigin for the Boxing Day events."

Life on the farm was busy with growing boys. To make extra funds Nell bred chooks, turkeys, and geese ready to sell before Christmas. The back yard was covered in feathers and the boys loved using these for the quills in their homemade bow and arrows.

Nell was an active member of the community and became very involved in the Yealering Church Guild and was the president for a time. She enjoyed finding thought provoking quotes and readings to share at the meetings. Around this time, she became a member of the East Pingelly Muscular Dystrophy group helping to fundraise for this worthy cause.

Later son Glenn was married to Geraldine Lego of Cadoux and Chris married Dianne Marshall from East Pingelly. They were thrilled when they first became grandparents with the first being Kirsten then followed Melina, Michael, Hayden, and Jennifer. The joy of grandchildren enriched their lives.

In 1981 Bernie and Nell decided to retire and officially moved to Mandurah returning to the farm to assist during shearing, seeding and harvest.

Nell joined the Mandurah CWA, and soon became the coordinator of the Movement to Music Group. Each year a new country was studied, and Nell would choreograph dance movements, and together the women would make costumes. One year they travelled up to Bulyee to perform their Greek Dance at the annual International Luncheon and did other shows in both Pinjarra and Bunbury. Nell continued her volunteer work with the Muscular Dystrophy Research Association joining the Mandurah branch and held the position of president for a time. After years of dedicated service, she was honoured, in 1994, when she received a lifetime membership award from the MDRA of Western Australia. Nell also did voluntary driving for the Red Cross taking people to medical appointments.

Unfortunately, as fate would have it, Bernie suffered a massive stroke in May of 1988 which paralysed the left side of his body. This changed the course of their retirement years as Nell was now the carer. Despite this setback, Nell, with steely determination and faith endeavoured to make the best out of life. The pen is mightier than the sword, so she immersed herself in writing poetry. To help her through hard times she would mindfully pen poems about all aspects of her life compiling a book entitled "The Harvest Forgives the Plough." She later wrote another book based on the Walton Family History, called "Whispers of the Past."

As mentioned earlier Nell learned how to embroider early in life, and continued using her creative talents doing tapestries, embroider pictures and knit perfect squares with which she made many throw rugs for family members. One of her designs was inspired by the story "The Coat of Many Colours," which she had heard when she was a child.

With need for more medical support, Nell and Bernie decided to relocate to "Amaroo Retirement Village' in Gosnells in 1996 where Nell's Aunty Rene, had retired to some years earlier. Her cousin Amy lived nearby, and they would attend church and enjoyed special outings together. Amy's daughters' Inez and Moya also visited regularly which brightened her days. Eventually Bernie required more care and moved to a nearby nursing home where Nell would visit her beloved husband regularly. After nearly 59 years of marriage, Bernie passed away on the 21^{st of} December 2006. This was a great loss for Nell as she adjusted to life as a widow. Without daily visits to see Bernie she filled the void with reading, keeping up with current events, watching much loved travel shows, knitting her colourful knee rugs and taking the train into the city to visit the art gallery, museum and shops where she loved to browse. Always so happy to see her family when they visited, and affectionately nursing her great grandchildren.

As health deteriorated, and her mobility declined Nell eventually moved to Kalkarni Residency in Brookton where in February 2018 she celebrated her 90th birthday surrounded by many close friends and family.

Sadly, dementia slowly stole Nell's mind and body however the carers at Kalkarni, attended to all her needs with love, empathy, and kindness. Thank you so much. Nell passed away peacefully on the 9th of October 2023.

A life well-lived, her love of all family and friends never wavering.







Normal trading hours will resume on Monday 29th January.




Garden Snippets...




...December-Do's

The calendar tells us that December heralds the beginning of summer, but the reality is that we have been feeling it for some time. There are lots of gardening jobs to do, so get an early start to beat the heat:

- Harvest any flowers for seed and store them in paper bags in a dry, cool, airy spot until autumn, when you can plant them out and get them going for some Next-Spring colour.
- Water-wise gardening is the order of the day. If water runs off your soil rather than soaking in then apply a wetting agent and repeat twice each year for best results. Be aware that plants in your garden have different watering requirements, and hot sunny areas will need more water than cool shady spots. Program the stations of your watering system to effectively apply water when and where it is required.
- Water garden beds deeply. Your garden will respond better to a good soak less often, rather than a little sprinkle every couple of days. Heavy clay soils may survive on a once-a-week watering, although sandy soils will need watering more often.
- Give your garden a good water-wise assessment. Check that plants have been grouped together according to their water needs, so that your watering can be more efficient at each station. If you need to transplant any to get your "groupings" right, make sure you do it in the cool of the late afternoon, and water in well afterwards, so that they have the cool of the night to settle into their new spots. Top up your mulch and remember to stick to your assigned watering day rosters. Additional watering may be necessary at times with a hand-held hose during excessive heat and windy spells.
- Tip-prune quick growing shrubs, and any native plants that have finished flowering, to keep them bushy and compact. Try to time this during a cool spell to reduce the stress on your plants.
- Plant warm weather bedding plants such as brachyscome, marigold and vinca. Plant seedlings in the late afternoon and hand water regularly until they are established.
- Weep an eye out for two-spotted mites (also called spider mites). These tiny sap sucking pests live on the underside of leaves, causing them to become blotchy, yellow and fall off. Remove the worst affected material and apply a pest oil in the late afternoon when it is cool.
- Rust and powdery mildew can affect a range of plants including roses, grapes and carnations. Control them by applying a lime sulphur spray in the late afternoon, Overhead irrigation exacerbates many fungal diseases, so think about switching to a drip system for watering.
- Merry Christmas, and Happy Holidays outside in the Garden .

Side dish suggestions to serve with your Christmas meats.

Smashed potato and herb salad

1.5kg small chat potatoes

3/4 cup olive oil

sea salt

1/2 cup white wine vinegar

1 lemon, juiced

2 tsp caster sugar

2 cups flat-leaf parsley leaves

2 tbsp dill, roughly chopped

1 bunch chives, chopped



Preheat oven to 180°C. Place potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with cold water. Bring to the boil over medium-high heat. Boil, uncovered, for 20 minutes or until just cooked when tested with a skewer. Drain. Allow to cool slightly. Place on chopping board.

Using your palm, gently press potatoes to flatten slightly. Place in a single layer in a large, greased roasting pan. Drizzle with 1/4 cup oil and sprinkle with sea salt. Roast for 30 minutes or until potatoes are crisp and golden. Transfer to a platter.

Whisk together vinegar, 1/4 cup lemon juice and remaining 1/2 cup oil in a bowl. Add sugar and season with pepper. Pour dressing over warm potatoes. Turn potatoes to coat in dressing. Sprinkle

Roast tomato, feta and pine nut rice salad

500g cherry tomatoes 1 red onion, cut into thin wedges olive oil cooking spray

2 garlic cloves

1 tsp sugar



1 1/2 cups white long-grain rice80g marinated feta cheese in olive oil2/3 cup pine nuts, toasted1/3 cup flat-leaf parsley, chopped

Preheat oven to 200°C. Line a roasting pan with baking paper. Place tomatoes and onion into roasting pan. Spray with oil. Crush garlic over tomatoes and onion. Sprinkle with sugar, and salt and pepper. Toss well to coat. Roast for 20 minutes, or until tomatoes are tender but still hold their shape. Meanwhile, cook rice by the absorption method, following packet directions. Set aside to cool to room temperature. Stir gently with a fork to separate grains. Drain feta, reserving 2 tablespoons of oil. Crumble feta over rice. Add pine nuts, parsley, tomato and onion mixture, and salt and pepper to rice. Drizzle with reserved feta oil. Stir gently to combine. Serve at room temperature.

Roasted pumpkin salad with honey and balsamic dressing

1.75kg butternut pumpkin, deseeded, cut into 2cm-thick pieces olive oil cooking spray

1/2 cup pine nuts

200g baby spinach

Honey and balsamic dressing

1/4 cup honey

2 tbsp balsamic vinegar

1 tbsp olive oil

Preheat oven to 250°C. Line 2 baking trays with baking paper. Place pumpkin in a single layer on trays. Spray with oil and turn to coat. Season with salt and pepper. Roast pumpkin, turning once, for 20 minutes or until golden and tender. Set aside to cool to room temperature.

Meanwhile, heat a small, non-stick frying pan over medium heat. Add pine nuts.

Cook, stirring, for 3 minutes or until golden.

Make honey and balsamic dressing: Combine honey, vinegar and oil in a screw top jar. Secure lid and shake to combine. Remove lid. Microwave on HIGH (100%) for 10 seconds or until honey is melted. Replace lid. Shake until well combined.

Place spinach and pumpkin in a large bowl. Sprinkle with pine nuts. Drizzle with dressing. Season with salt and pepper. Serve.





REINDEER GINGERBREAD COOKIES

2 cups plain flour (plus additional for sprinkling) 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

½ teaspoon ground nutmeg ¼ teaspoon ground cloves 2 teaspoons ground ginger

¼ teaspoon baking powder 1/3 cup packed brown sugar ¼ teaspoon salt

1/3 cup molasses (or golden syrup) ½ cup salted butter @ room temperature 1 egg

ICING


1 1/2 cups icing sugar ¼ teaspoon vanilla extract 2 egg whites

DECORATING SUPPLIES

Gingerbread man cookie cutter, squeeze bottle, 36 chocolate chips, 18 red M & M's

METHOD:

- 1. In a medium bowl, use a fork to whisk together the flour, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, cloves, salt and baking
- In a large bowl beat the butter and brown sugar together until creamy.
- 3. On low speed, mix the egg and molasses into the butter and sugar.
- 4. Still on low speed, add the dry ingredients (about ½ cup at a time to prevent a mess) and mix well.
- 5. Divide the dough into 2 balls and dust them with flour. Wrap 1 ball in plastic wrap and refrigerate it.
- 6. Place the other ball on a sheet of baking paper dusted with flour.
- 7. Place another sheet of baking paper on top and roll the dough our to about 1/8 inch thick.
- 8. Place the rolled sheet of dough in the freezer for 20 minutes.
- 9, Preheat the oven to 180° C.
- 10. Remove the sheet of dough from the freezer and use your cookie cutter to cut out 9 gingerbread men. You will have to re-roll your scraps to get all 9 but should not need to freeze the dough again.
- 11. Place the gingerbread men on baking paper on oven tray and bake for about 10 minutes. Cookies need to be firm with the edges just starting to darken.
- 12. Transfer the cookies to a wire rack to cool completely and repeat the rolling, cutting and cooking with the second ball of dough.
- 13. For the icing: whisk the egg whites until frothy.
- 14. Mix in the vanilla, then add icing sugar, ¼ cup at a time while mixing on low speed.
- 15. Turn the speed up to high and 2whisk for 6 to 8 minutes until stiff, glossy peaks form.
- 16. Scoop the icing into a squeeze bottle or a plastic bag with the end snipped off.
- 17. Pipe antlers, eyebrows, ears and a mouth onto each cooled cookie.
- 18. Using a pair of scissors or a paring knife, snip the points off each chocolate chip.
- 19. One at a time, pipe 2 ovals for eyes onto each cookie. Place a chocolate chip upside down into each oval.
- 20. Working with 4 cookies at a time, place a dot of icing above the mouth and stick on a red M & M.
- 21. Make sure you let the icing harden completely before stacking the cookies.
