



Taoist Tai Chi group celebrates 50 years of giving health

Taoist Tai Chi is a slow, gentle but rigorous series of movements which work on the whole body and mind.

The Narrogin Branch of the Taoist Tai Chi Society will help celebrate the International Societies 50th Anniversary by offering a complimentary 'try-it' class in Narrogin at Mackie Park (near the Town Hall) on Thursday 20th February from 6.00 – 7.15 pm. They will be joining a dozen other branches of the Taoist Tai Chi Society of Australia to offer 50 open classes in 50 iconic locations around Australia during 2020.


Taoist Tai Chi was introduced to the Western world 50 years ago this year, by a Taoist monk, Master Moy Lin Shin, who had trained with masters of the Taoist arts in Hong Kong. His training helped him overcome the debilitating ill-health he had suffered as a youth. He made a vow to devote the rest of his life to share his knowledge to help others.

Today, 50 years later, residents of Narrogin, Williams and surrounds are benefiting from the practice of this health art. They are among the tens of thousands who are now practising in 26 countries, feeling healthier, more energised and calmer due to the efforts of the volunteer and not-for-profit organisation that Master Moy set up.

Background about Taoist Tai Chi

Medical research shows good evidence that tai chi can boost immune function, help control the symptoms of conditions such as Parkinson's Disease and fibromyalgia, reduce the risk of falls, improve cardiovascular function, and improve mood and cognitive function.

Taoist Tai Chi is accessible to all, whether you are in perfect health and want to maintain it or if you have severe health problems and wish to improve. The moves and





OUR CRUISE - QUEEN ELIZABETH



On 6th December Keith and I boarded the Queen Elizabeth for our first cruise, feeling a bit apprehensive and in awe. The day was hot, 44° when we boarded in Fremantle. Staff were wonderful and it didn't take long for our luggage to be taken from us and we headed for Deck 7, inner cabin, for our cruise. The room was adequate with a queen size bed, ensuite, fridge and a bottle of champagne in a bucket of ice as a welcome. Took some time finding our way around. Our first meal was in a lovely dining room and we were seated with 4 others from eastern states. While lovely, we decided to eat most meals in the smorgasbord area on 9th deck.

As we were very tired, we decided to retire at 9pm, even though we would have liked to see the ship leave. Our bed was turned down with a chocolate each on the bed. Nice touch. (Each morning our bed was made up and each evening bed turned down with chocolates.)

Following day we were able to wander around more. There were so many activities going on. Each morning there was a "daily news" pamphlet in a pocket outside our room as well as a paper on the daily activities. There were live concerts, movies, dance classes, craft classes, a casino, bingo, trivial pursuit, talks by interesting people and many other activities (all when at sea). The library was on two floors, housing 7,000 books.

The foyer and staircase on the main deck were delightful. One could lounge in chairs and listen each evening to a pianist, a guitarist, a harpist and 3 ladies on violins. There were other entertainers but these are what we saw.





There were several bars and coffee lounges. A lovely sun lounge with glass dome ceiling. There were two pools, one each end of the ship plus two spas each end. Speaking of which, the weather was so cool from the day after we left, that we didn't venture into pool or spas. One day we had rain and it was almost freezing. There was very little wake on the water, and the ship just gave a gentle rock, even going through the bite. There was only one deck where one could walk right around, the full length being 0.9miles.

There were magnificent flower decorations in the main foyer. Christmas trees were also magnificently decorated with the lady decorators wearing T-shirts with "professional Christmas decorators" embroidered on the back.



Our first port of call was Albany and we took a bus tour around town and to the Anzac memorial. This lasted about 4 hours before we had to return to the ship. Even from a distance on Mt Clarence, the ship looked enormous.

Two days at sea before calling into Esperance where we needed to get a tender

to get to shore. We then took a town tour when at 1pm we met up with Keith's daughter, Debbie, who was working until that time. This time we were able to stay on deck while the ship departed. Hard to believe we were moving, it was so smooth and quiet.

When we went to eating areas, there was a steward at the entrance offering hand sanitizer. If no steward, there was an automatic sanitizer for patrons to use. Now we've all heard that most germs come from putting hands on door handles. In all the "Public" toilets, there was a sign asking patrons to please use paper towel to open door, then place it in the bin provided. (Despite that I ended up with a throat infection which started on the very last day).

On 12th December we docked in Adelaide and were up early to take a tour at 9.30 to the lovely Hahndorf. Bus driver was great and explained a lot of history. We went to Mt Lofty and were saddened to hear the fires went through there more recently. It was a lovely place to visit. On our return we went to the lovely theatre to watch the movie "Bohemian Rhapsody".





The "Queens Room" comprises of a stage with magnificent curtains. In front of the stage is a dance floor which was used often by a lot of the guests. Live bands perform from this stage and dance classes held in this area. However, afternoon tea is served here as well, each afternoon while at sea, where the small dining tables are placed around the dance floor. Waiters are dressed in white, serving tea from beautiful teapots in proper tea cups, coffee served from silver coffee pots, and scones, jam and cream and little cakes and biscuits were also served. How to feel really special!!! This was our last day on board and we regretted not having taken the opportunity of participating in the afternoon teas more often. Better for the waistline though!!!!

About a week before arriving in Melbourne, in one alcove on the ship, about 6 chefs got together to make a myriad of ginger bread houses. These, plus decorations, are all edible but unfortunately we weren't offered any before disembarking.

ACCESS TO LIFESAVING DEVICES IN THE SHIRE OF WICKEPIN - 24/7

The Wickepin Shire is pleased to advise that Wickepin and Yealering now have access to a lifesaving Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Device 24 hours a day, 7 days a week via a locked box placed outside the public toilets on the Main St in Wickepin and the back of the Town Hall (Lakeside) in Yealering.

An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the lifethreatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation (VF) and pulseless ventricular tachycardia and is able to treat them through defibrillation. The application of electricity which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to re-establish an effective rhythm.

With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the layperson and the use of AEDs is taught in many first aid, certified first responder. support (BLS) level cardiopulmonary and basic life resuscitation (CPR) classes.

When the Shire was approached by Wendy Butler from the local St Johns Sub Station she emphasized the priority of access to these devices having a direct impact on the potential positive outcome, with a life literally depending on it should the need arise.

She also mentioned that most of the 5 devices in the Shire have been supplied through generous donations by the local community

To demystify these devices St Johns is also offering short AED awareness presentations throughout the community to ensure people know where they are and how and when to use an AED. They are also promoting the free St Johns First Responder App which provides GPS positioning if calling 000 from it to activate local first responders, an ambulance and notify the closest holder of an AED to mobilise it to the scene if required. That's a lot of help coming quickly! The app also provides first aid prompts for a lot of common and not so common accidents such as blue bottle stings, scalds/burns and snake bite.











What do our new cat laws mean for you and your feline friend?

As from 1 November 2013, all domestic cats in Western Australia, over six months of age, will need to be sterilised, microchipped and registered with their local government as the full Cat Act 2011 comes into effect.

What does this mean for you and your feline friend?

From 1 November 2013, all cats that have reached six months of age are required to be:

- Microchipped;
- Sterilised; and
- Registered with the relevant local government.

Your cat will be required to wear a collar and registration tag to ensure they can be easily identified and returned to you if they become lost.

My cat is very old - do I still need to have it sterilised?

Yes, our legislation applies to all cats of all ages.

However, your vet can issue an exemption certificate if sterilising your cat is likely to have a negative impact on your cat's health and welfare.

How does this affect cat breeders?

The legislation requires that a person who chooses to breed cats must apply to their local government for a

When a cat is sold or given away, the seller must ensure the cat is microchipped and sterilised prior to transfer.

If the cat cannot be sterilised due to its health or age. the seller must issue a prepaid sterilisation voucher to the new owner.

What concessions or assistance will be available for pensioners or low income earners?

The Government has provided funding to assist and provide low cost sterilisation for cats owned by pensioners and people on low income.

Pensioners will also receive a discount on registration fees.

What is the purpose of the Cat Act 2011?

Our new cat laws are about encouraging responsible pet ownership and reducing the number of unwanted cats in the community and the number that are euthanised each vear.

The full Cat Act 2011 will take effect from 1 November 2013 and will require all cats that have reached six months of age to be:

- Microchipped;
- Sterilised; and
- Registered with the relevant local government.





Progressive Ag Winner 2019



In partnership with the Shire of Wickepin, the Facey Group present and annual Progressive Agricultural Award—recognising the importance of sustainability, thinking outside the square and dedication to the rural community and agricultural industry as a whole. The recipient will have displayed management contribution to sustainable and progressive agriculture in the region.

The Smith Family—Kingussie Faming were awarded the 2019 award. Other nominees received for the 2019 Progressive Ag Award included Ricky and Maree Dougall and the Angwin family.

The Smith family have been farming since 1945, being third generation on the home farm. A family run operation with Ken and his sons Shayne, Troy and Lee and families.

A mixed farming business—with cropping and livestock, including Kingussie Merino Stud. The business has continually grown, and the purchase and lease of more land to expand and increase the number of hectares cropped and the number of sheep they run.

The Smith's do not use a set rotation but rather consider paddocks on an individual basis for how they will be utilised each year—whether for cropping or for the management and running of sheep or to clean up weeds for following years.

The enterprise has brought on more machinery to assist in the seeding and harvesting program—which has assisted in getting over the expanding land area and also allows for the management of stock throughout these pressuring times and the movement between properties.

The family has continued to expand their operation, in which each of them look after their own patch but still collaboratively make farm decisions together. Farming over different locations has allowed them to spread risk across their operation through differing rainfall received, frost and across a spread of soil types.

The Smith Family were recognised nationally in 2014 as the Grain Grower of the Year and have continued to actively and progressively expand their business and integrate new management strategies for long term sustainability.

The Smith family are very open in knowledge sharing and a key asset to local agriculture; whilst being great advocates for the industry.

A big thank you to President Julie Russell and fellow councillors at the Shire of Wickepin for their continued support of this award.

I would like to congratulate the Smith Family on receiving this award and look forward to continual progression and innovation in the our fabulous industry.



Recipes for school lunchboxes

Ham and corn fritters

INGREDIENTS

100g sliced ham, chopped

125g can corn kernels, drained

2 spring onions, thinly sliced

1/4 cup self-raising flour

METHOD

1 egg, lightly whisked 2 tbs milk 2 tbs olive oil



Place the ham, corn, spring onion, flour, egg and milk in a medium bowl. Stir until well combined. Season. Heat the oil in a large non-stick frying pan over medium heat. Add four 1/4-cup portions of the egg mixture to pan. Use a spatula to flatten slightly. Cook for 2-3 mins each side or until golden brown and cooked through. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towel. Set aside to cool slightly. Serve warm or at room temperature

Mini bread quiches



12 slices sandwich bread, crusts removed 100g zucchini, coarsely grated 1/4 cup coarsely grated tasty cheddar

2 rashers rindless bacon, finely chopped

1 tbs chopped chives

3 eggs, lightly whisked

1 head broccoli, cut

into florets, chopped

5 eggs, lightly whisked

1 1/4 cups grated Cheddar cheese

1 cup frozen peas

1 tbs milk

METHOD

Preheat oven to 180°C. Grease 6 holes of a 1/3-cup muffin pan. Place 1 slice of bread on a clean work surface. Arrange another slice of bread on top at a 45-degree angle. Use a rolling pin to roll out bread slices until 5mm thick. Repeat with remaining bread slices. Line the prepared holes with bread, pressing down firmly. Spray with olive oil spray. Bake for 15 mins or until just golden.

Combine zucchini, cheddar, bacon and chives in a bowl. Divide evenly among the bread cases. Whisk the egg and milk in a jug and pour evenly over the zucchini mixture. Season. Bake for 20-25 mins or until the egg mixture is light golden and just set. Cool slightly. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Cheesy bacon and veggie rice slice

INGREDIENTS

1 tbs olive oil

1 small brown onion, chopped

4 short-cut bacon rashers, chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

250g pkt microwavable long-grain rice

200g sweet potato, peeled, coarsely grated

METHOD

Preheat oven to 190°C. Line a 16cm x 26cm (base measurement) slice pan with baking paper, allowing the 2 long sides to overhang.

Heat the oil in a frying pan over medium heat. Cook the onion and bacon, stirring occasionally, for 5 mins or until light golden. Add garlic and cook, stirring, for 30 secs. Transfer to a large bowl. Set aside to cool slightly.

Heat the rice following packet directions. Add to the bacon mixture in the bowl with the sweet potato, broccoli, peas and 1 cup cheese. Stir until combined. Fold in the egg. Season.

Spoon the mixture into the prepared pan, pressing down firmly. Smooth the surface. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Lightly sprinkle with paprika, if desired.

Bake for 30 mins or until set and golden brown. Set aside in the pan for 5 mins to cool slightly. Cut into pieces.
